The 4th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution prevents unfair search and seizure.


Crime Fighting - Deterrence - Game Theory

The rational individual is deterred from crime.

Criminal Penalties based on an Escalation Policy:


- ① Warning

Crime Rate Declining. Why?

- ① Police crackdowns
- ② Community policing
- ③ Longer prison sentences for repeat offenders,
3 strikes your out.



Victimization - People fail to report crime to police.

- 2x as many fail to report crime

- why? Police not effective in dealing with crime.

Juvenile Crime - Not based on deterrence

- Children not responsible for actions, rarely impose serious punishment
- 15-17 yr olds - 20% of nations committe.
- absence of deterrent contributes to juvenile crime
- 50 states trying juvenile offenders for serious crimes

Deterrence vs. Liberty

Protection from Crime vs. Freedom from Repression

(Americans prefer this)


Current Event: Patriot Act.

- certainty - justice must be sure
- swiftness - justice must be swift
- severity - punishment must outweigh benefits of life or crime on the streets
justice must be severe.

Does Crime Pay?




① Lack of certainty - very few crimes result in jail sentences

② Lack of swiftness - courts are slow, delays benefit the criminal defendant.

③ Question of Severity - dramatic increase in time served after violent offenders

Increased severity of punishment
leads to declining crime rate?



Community Police discretion - attitude of people toward police. More respectful, less chance of being arrested.

Community Policing - walking, bicycling, being visible

Police Crackdowns - beefed up actions, only work if supported by community.

Broken Window Strategy - NYC Times Square
- Mayor Giuliani
- one broken window leads to other broken windows.

Broken windows \Rightarrow Petty offenses \Rightarrow more serious crime.

Worked in NYC, crime fell in 5 yrs by 50% and murders fell by 70%.





SUMMARY

- ① Crime rates falling since 1993.
- stricter penalties, longer jail time.
- ② Deterrence requires punishment to be:
- certain
- swift
- severe
- ③ Punishment is not certain or swift
- likelihood of going to jail 1 in 100
- speedy trial rule
- ④ Longer prison terms leading to
lower crime rate.

- (5) Not sure if increased police protection reduces the amount of crime.
 - Community policing effective
 - Broken windows NYC effective
- (6) States with strict gun control laws do not have lower rates of crime
- (7) Public policies toward drug use are mixed and ineffective
- (8) Increase court bargaining such as end less appeals, increases trials and detracts from deterrence
- (9) 50% of serious charges dismissed before trial.
Plus bargaining most effective means of reducing criminal cases
- (10) Prisons fail to rehabilitate prisoners.
Prisons reduce crime only by keeping criminals off streets
Most paroled criminals will commit crime again.
- (11) Capital punishment is not an effective deterrent formula.
