# Funding the Superfund

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## Introduction

The Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Superfund program is responsible for cleaning up contaminated lands and responding to environmental emergencies.

- Cleaning up Superfund sites is a complex, multi-phase process, requiring immense funding
- Who pays for Superfund?

## **Historical Context**

- 1980: Congress established Superfund under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA)
- CERCLA authorizes EPA to compel the responsible parties to clean up contaminated sites and seek reimbursement

#### Other Funding:

- CERCLA established a trust fund financed by taxes on crude oil and certain chemicals
  - Authority for taxes expired in 1995
- EPA receives annual appropriations from the trust fund for program activities

# **Policy Analysis**

#### Official/Unofficial Actors:

- EPA & States
- Polluters (Current Owners/Operators, Past Owner/Operator, Arrangers, or Transporters)

#### Policy Concerns: EPA cleanup goals are unrealistic

- No current technology can clean these sites to government's standards
- Tracking waste once it leaves a site is almost impossible
- Major decisions are left to private companies
- The cost of cleaning up hazardous sites is increasing

#### Sustainability considerations:

- Environmental program addresses environmental sustainability
- Economic program has been depleted, inefficient sources of funding
- Equity program addresses environmental justice issues
